My comment:

Thanks for digging further into this story, David. It's re-assuring to hear confirmation from Hume, and Walton, that the urban boundary in the current review will stay where it is... for residential development. Their statement makes clear that they're in the game on the discussion about employment lands. Part 3 of Walton's grand plan is about employment lands (consistent with their aim to build "complete communities").

For the long-to-very-long term, earlier comments are interesting but the arguments are all looking back. If there is a future for the human species, does it include continuing to gobble up agricultural land near cities? I think Walton's investors made the wrong bet here. In the long run there 'll be more money in sustainable agriculture.
