We have done a poor job of securing green space in perpetuity. Developers have been able to pave every available square inch without contributing any (substantial) lands to the permanent greening of our city. There are important lands adjacent to our watershed available now, and we must act to protect and/or acquire them before they are gone forever. I also propose that instead of turning

LeBreton flats into a hockey arena that we take a page from history, and convert it into a permanent garden, not unlike Butchart Gardens in Victoria. What was once an abandoned quarry is now a precious area that generates great financial return for the area; dare we dream so big for LeBreton, before we turn into an arena? Who will pay for it's demolition and replacement in fifty years once the team is sold and moves away? We should retain control of the land, while we can.
